

**HUBERTA JACKSON-LOWMAN, Ph.D.**

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Huberta Jackson-Lowman is a Professor of Psychology and a past Chair of the Department of Psychology at Florida A&M University in Tallahassee, Florida where she teaches graduate and undergraduate students. She has a doctorate in Clinical Psychology from the University of Pittsburgh. A Fulbright-Hays Scholar and editor of the anthology *Afrikan American Women: Living at the Crossroads of Race, Gender, Class and Culture* (2021), her post-doctoral career spans nearly 40 years and has consisted of roles in both the private and public sectors. She is the Immediate Past President of the National Association of Black Psychologists (ABPsi) and is certified by ABPsi as a diplomate and fellow in Afrikan-centered psychology. Over the past nine years, she has led the Tallahassee Community Healing Coalition in the implementation of Tallahassee Community Healing Days, a national Community Healing Network initiative, honored by the Community Healing Network, Inc. for their work. Dr. Jackson-Lowman's research examines the effects of the intersectionality of race, gender, class, and culture on the health, mental health, and relationships of women of Afrikan ancestry and explores the use of cultural strategies in the socialization of Black youth. An emerging area of research focuses on the use of cultural standards and policy to reset standards and norms in troubled Black communities and foster a sense of agency and empowerment. She is blessed with a very loving and supportive husband, and together they have a daughter, two sons, and five grandchildren along with godchildren that are very dear to them.
